
The theme of the Oratory's new pastoral year is a slight reworking of an expression from the Gospel according to Mark (11, 22-23): "Jesus answered them, 'Have faith in God. Truly I tell you, if you say to this mountain, "Be taken up and thrown into the sea", and if you do not doubt in your heart, but believe that what you say will come to pass, it will be done for you.'" Simply put, what I mean is that, if someone told the mountain: "Get up and jump into the sea,"

and had no hint of doubt in his heart, then this would happen. During the 2012 pastoral year, what we will be talking about at the Oratory is: **A faith that moves mountains.**

This theme is a reminder that the Oratory was built on the rock of Mount Royal, whose aspect it has transformed since 1904. It is also a reminder of Brother André's deep faith, which transformed the mountain into a place of pilgrimage and welcome. Brother André, with his unshakeable faith in Saint Joseph and with the help of his many friends, made it a place dedicated to prayer and meditation. He also made it a refuge, where pilgrims can lay down their troubles.

Mount Royal was transformed by Saint Brother André's faith. Since then, millions of pilgrims have continued to experience this place of hope that is Saint Joseph's Oratory. They have transformed the mountain by visiting it faithfully, they have made it a place to encounter with God. On Mount Royal, they leave behind their daily routines, and they unburden themselves about things that may seem to them like mountains: illnesses, unemployment, conflicts of all kinds. To this day, on the mountain, they find hope and comfort.

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



A meal with friends


Each year, the Sundays of October are an opportunity for us to welcome some 2,000 associates, who come to share with us a prayer and a friendly meal.



Making a bequest to Saint Joseph's Oratory of Mount Royal... Within everybody's reach!

More and more people are considering the Oratory's planned giving program because it is a great way to help the shrine continue its mission for years to come. However, some people still think that making a bequest is only for the rich or the unmarried.

Even though of modest income, a person is deemed to have disposed of all his or her property at fair market value at the time of death. This may lead to significant capital gains, which are taxable. So, it is important to always consider the tax impacts of how you dispose of your assets at the time of your death, to determine which option is most advantageous for your heirs.

The story of a kind-hearted lady with good foresight

Mrs. Gagnon is a 65-year-old widow; she retired this year and wants to review her will. Saint Joseph's Oratory holds an important place in her heart, and she would like to make a planned donation in order to help preserve this wonderful shrine. However, out of concern for her children's well-being, she wants to make sure her philanthropic gesture will not deprive them of a large portion of their inheritance. She wonders about the tax burden her children would have to shoulder upon her death. Her tax bracket is 48.2%.

Mrs. Gagnon has \$200,000 in her RRSPs that she doesn't think she will use because she has few expenses and has a pension that allows her to live comfortably. She vacations at her cottage, which she purchased over 20 years ago, and this allows her to spend time with her children. This cottage has a market value of \$150,000. Because she bought it for \$75,000, she will have earned capital gains of \$75,000 upon her death, 50% of which will be taxable. She also owns a home evaluated at \$335,000 (with no mortgage), which she inherited from her parents and wishes to pass on to her children. In summary:

Ms. Gagnon wonders what would happen if she named Saint Joseph's Oratory as the beneficiary of her life insurance policy. The impact would be as follows:

Mrs. Gagnon quickly realized that, in addition to generating significant tax savings, this donation would benefit a charity that is close to her heart. The real net cost of a \$50,000 donation, i.e. the difference from the net inheritance, is \$8,633.33 for each of her three children. Moreover, taxes payable to the government are cut by \$24,100.

In conclusion

Whether you choose to leave Saint Joseph's Oratory a life insurance policy, a percentage of your assets, a residence or your RRSPs, your donation will have a positive impact not only in terms of the taxes payable upon your death, but for the continuation of this wonderful sanctuary and Saint Brother André's mission. In the short term, you will feel good about yourself and will set a wonderful example for your children.

I would like to take this opportunity to wish you all the best during this beautiful Christmas season. May peace, happiness, joy, love and especially health be with you every day in the New Year. And thank you for your generosity.

Gratitude to Saint Brother André!

At age 57, André Richard, who retired in 2008 from the electrical supply industry after 30 years, is still very active and still thinks about others.

He agreed to meet with me at the Oratory to tell me about his attachment to this wonderful sanctuary and to Brother André.

He told me about his philanthropic project and why he has chosen to make a bequest to Saint Joseph's Oratory of Mount Royal.


He explains, "(...) In 2009, I was deeply betrayed by certain friends, which led me to question several aspects of my life.

(...) I got up one morning and decided to get back to basics, so I prayed to Brother André because I remembered that he is the reason why I can walk today. I decided to make him a bigger part of my life. If I needed someone, I would turn to him."

I asked him to tell me his story.

He was born with a bone malformation in both legs. On the recommendation of his doctor, his parents consulted specialists at the Children's Hospital. His case was extremely rare, and required exploratory surgery because the doctors didn't know what else to do. The doctors recommended a second surgery, but they all thought that his chances of ever walking were slim. His father refused the second surgery; he didn't want his son to suffer unnecessarily.

Mr. Richard told me his parents were strong believers in Brother André, which is why he is named André, instead of Fernand, after his godfather. "My mother is a Bessette. I remember that my maternal grandfather loved

telling us about this connection, and about his memories of Brother André.

(...) My parents turned to prayer; my father, my mother and my grandmother prayed every day to Brother André. I would see them go into the church next to the hospital, and I often went with them." He told me that, as he grew up, the bones in his legs slowly healed, and, although he walked much later than most children, he had no lasting ill effects.

Since his crisis of faith in 2009, since he started praying again, he told me his life has improved on many levels.

"Before, I wasn't a happy person, not very sociable, closed in. Now, since turning to Brother André, I'm a changed man. I go for two-hour walks every day, I help others, I am more open to people and more positive.

I realize that maintaining and renovating the Oratory is expensive, and

that's why I want to make a substantial donation upon my death to pay homage to Brother André and to thank him."

Mr. Richard is convinced that, once again, praying to Brother André has helped him.

He continued, "(...) I identify with Brother André because he persevered in his life and believed in his dreams. He is an example to follow."

Mr. Richard prays at the Oratory as often as he can. And this avid biker never misses the blessing of the motorcycles each May, and takes that opportunity to light a candle.

In conclusion, "I was there on October 30 at the Olympic Stadium and I am extremely happy that his work and his miracles have finally been recognized."

For these reasons, André Richard has chosen to donate a significant portion of his estate to Saint Joseph's Oratory of Mount Royal.

I would like to thank André Richard for his moving story and his generous act!

Thanks also to all our generous donors, who help to ensure the continuity of Saint Brother André's mission and Saint Joseph's Oratory.

New things to see at the Oratory Museum

Since October, visitors to the Oratory have been admiring the displays featuring Brother André's life. The first phase of the renovations to the permanent exhibit was unveiled during the novena to Saint Joseph, in March. It highlighted the steps leading up to Brother André's canonization. This time, the focus is on his childhood, emigration to the United States, admission to the Congregation of Holy Cross, work at Collège Notre-Dame and construction of the Oratory. The exhibit also includes photographs showing the devotion of an entire people to this man, who was at once a friend, a brother, a saint.

During the Christmas season, the Oratory Museum will present an exhibit of nativity scenes showcasing Québec artists and artisans. Works in wood, ce-



ramic, glass, paper and a variety of other materials will demonstrate the diversity and wealth of originality in their representations of the Nativity. There will be new additions for 2010-2011 and nativity scenes from over 100 countries around the world, for a total of 200. The exhibit opened on Saturday, November 5, 2011 – a wonderful outing for the entire family!




The Holy Land: a tradition for the Oratory

A travelling statue

An element familiar to visitors to Saint Joseph's Oratory has finally found a permanent home. A beloved statue of the Virgin Mary has now been erected on the very rock of Mount Royal itself, next to the Votive Chapel, near the elevators. This location, evocative of the Lourdes grotto, highlights this antique statue donated in 1909, before which Saint Brother André often prayed. Initially located next to the original chapel, the statue then embellished the front of the Basilica during its construction, and later welcomed pilgrims at the top of the main stairway. Before moving to its new home last spring, the statue of the Virgin spent some time at the foot of the Oratory's 50th anniversary mural.
